There's this poem by T.S. Eliot called "The Love-Song of J. Alfred Prufrock," in which the main character says "It's impossible to say just what I mean!" That's how I feel sometimes—it's very hard for me to express just what I want to say!

I first would like to apologize for not being the coordinator that I wanted to be—for not being the spiritual leader that I had hoped to be. There was a period this semester where I was distracted by the logistics of being coordinator and the busyness of school and life, and just went through the motions, without thinking about the heart behind all the things that we do. On a personal note, though, being coordinator has been a great experience for me. God has forced me to re-examine my own personal walk with Him, and made me realize that I must be increasingly personal and real with Him. He must be in my heart and on my lips. I love all the lessons that God has taught me through this semester—of doing things for God's glory rather than my own, of being responsible, and of digging deeper into who God is.

Our vision for this year was Philippians 3:8-11, but specifically 10:

that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death,

I just wanted to take a moment to challenge you in regards to this vision. In our walks with God, it's not where we're at right now that really matters, but where we're heading. Oftentimes we can become complacent about who we are—thinking that we have attained to a certain level of spirituality or maturity, but even if we have, be reminded that our heart must continually yearn for more of God. I love the song "Cry in my heart," because there's a line that says "there must be more than this." In my own walk with God, I realize that, if the Bible is true and God is real, then I have really experienced so little of Him. I will admit that I don't have a heart that truly loves and knows God at this point, but I'm filled with the certainty that there must be something so much more to God and in God than I have experienced. I am filled with the hunger to know what that is and to fully live that out. It is my intense desire that CBS be brought deeper into the heart of what it means to live for Christ and have that hunger to know what we're still missing. If the Bible is true, how should we live our lives? If God says that our relationship with Him is what life is all about, do we live like that? Is Christ really the reason why we do things? # Evangelism Ministry

Dear Chinese Bible Study,

The beginning of this semester was both a very exciting and challenging time for us as evange-lism ministry coordinators. During the past few years and particularly, this past spring semester, there were several clear indications of corporate growth in regards to evangelism. This change was evident, not only in Chinese Bible Study, but also in the entire Christian body on campus. In some ways, this heart for evangelism was reflected in the spirit of weekly interfellowship prayer meetings as well as the general excitement for Monday and Thursday EV. Due to the growing passion for evangelism, this was an exciting, yet daunting time for us to step up and serve God through EV ministry.

The vision that we had at the start of the semester was that God would continue to cultivate our hearts for evangelism and compassion for the lost so that we would always be prepared to share the gospel. Our hope was to see the fellowship pursue sanctification and have not only a passion for God, but also a clear understanding of their faith:

"But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts, and always be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you, with meekness and fear." (1 Peter 3:15)

As the semester progressed, the focus of evangelism ministry appeared to shift from cold-contact EV to personal and relational EV. To reach out to non-Christians in CBS, we began the "Gospel Friends Initiative." This involved pairing a Christian with a non-Christian, or gospel friend, to establish relationships that might create additional opportunities for personal testimony and evangelism. We also spent time in prayer for the underclassmen and met up with a few to encourage them to evangelize to their friends.

Nevertheless, we also encountered some difficulties this semester with regards to our ministry. One of the greatest challenges for us was the declining passion in CBS for evangelism. While this is not true for everyone, there appears to be a general lack of excitement throughout the fellowship – compared to the previous semester.

"One thing I ask of the LORD, this is what I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the LORD and to seek Him in His temple." (Psalm 27:4)

However, with winter break coming up, we pray that God will again revive our hearts and again desire to seek Him.

Thus, this year for InReach ministry, we wanted to obey and take to heart this command by translating our faith in Christ Jesus into action to serve Him and each other.

Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in brotherly love. Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with God's people who are in need. Practice hospitality. – Romans 12:9-13

Paul reminds us that love must come from the heart and that sincere love can only be found by putting our faith in God and knowing Him. Through InReach meetings, we have learned that as we continue to grow in our faith and knowledge of God, we will continue to experience His goodness and love that He has shown us on the Cross, and as believers in Christ Jesus, we are able to convey that same love to our friends and families. We have also discovered that love, hating evil (sin) and clinging to what is good (God), devotion to one other, humility, serving, joy in hope, patience in affliction, and faithfulness in prayer, are all found in knowing the characteristics of Christ Jesus. We want to know that this love and service only comes from the One who demonstrated the ultimate love and service by giving up His heavenly throne to humbly serve us, sinners who fall short of God's glory, and to die on the Cross to save us. Without Him, there is no real love.


