

Editor's Letter

Dear Chinese Bible Study,

Praise the Lord for bringing us through another semester here at Cornell! Although not all times may have been as pleasant to experience as others, we are truly thankful for the love and grace that God has shown to each one of us and to our fellowship as a whole.

This semester has truly been about living our life as mission, but what does that actually mean? Are we supposed to stand in the center of the quad every day handing out KGP booklets? Are we supposed to be praying on our knees for 24 hours a day even for those of us with bad ACLs?

Throughout our study of the book of Nehemiah this semester, we have seen Nehemiah achieve some remarkable accomplishments. Not only did he rebuild the wall of Jerusalem in 52 days, he repopulated the city and changed the entire culture of the Jewish community by teaching and enforcing the law of Moses. Not bad for a humble cupbearer to the king.

What was most impressive in my mind about the life of Nehemiah, however, was his incredible devotion to God and his burden for the people of Jerusalem. His actions of prayer and fasting not only demonstrated his love and faith in God, but also exhibited a heart of compassion through suffering and self-sacrifice. And this heart is the crux of the matter, the root of living our lives as mission.

Studying the book of Philippians this semester has been particularly pertinent for me, as many of the themes in Nehemiah are re-established and recur throughout Paul's letter. By far joy is the prevailing mood throughout the letter: "What then? Only that in every way, whether in pretense or in truth, Christ is preached; and in this I rejoice, yes, and will rejoice." (Philippians 1:18). But how can we have joy during the tough times? While happiness in life is fleeting and dependent on our current state of affairs, joy is a constant attitude that we ought to embrace as it comes from within us, from Him who lives in us. As it says in 1 Thessalonians 16-18: "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

It is not thus how much we give, but why we give. As it says in 1 Samuel 16:7, "The Lord does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart." As we learned, salvation is not the sum of faith and works, but genuine faith that results in salvation and good works. Whether that results in much immediate fruit is not the question, but rather the heart behind your thoughts and actions. Are you broken for those trapped in sin? Are you burdened for those around you who may never have heard the Gospel of Jesus Christ? Do you sincerely love your brothers and sisters?

Wherever God has placed us, it is our responsibility to discern how we will respond to His calling. Some of us may even be called to serve right in our own backyard here in Ithaca. Instead of thinking "I am just here to study", see yourself as building God's kingdom; instead of saying "I am just a student", say "I am a soldier for Christ, faithfully serving Him to the very end." So whether God calls you to Albany, Arizona, Argentina, or even Africa, He has a wonderful and specific life of mission planned for each one of us. May God bless you in the months and years to come as you embark upon the perfect life of mission He has determined for you.

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." (Acts 1:8)

Beloved brothers and sisters, caught up on this Cornell campus, and often engulfed in an Asian culture filled with harsh expectations: do not lose heart, and do not get trapped by feeling unworthy. Seek freedom: freedom from sin, freedom in Christ. Because it's about Him and Him alone.

You're all that we want; You're all that we need. ("Where the Spirit of the Lord Is")

Coordinator Letter 2

It's a daunting task...writing this Coordinator BoL letter. God has not particularly placed anything on my heart to share at this moment but I think that God will be able to use this letter to encourage whoever may read it - perhaps some future coordinator also writing their BoL at the last minute.

This year is about life as mission. The vision is simple: life as mission. It is to see our lives here at Cornell as not simply a passing four years of academics but also an opportunity to both grow in our relationship with God and to pour out as ambassadors of the Gospel. I sometimes paraphrase Jesus' final words to us in Acts 1:8 as, "But you will be my witness, to your close family and friends, to your classmates and acquaintances, even to people you don't like or agree with, and to Cornell and the ends of the earth." This idea illustrates the series of concentric spheres of influence that we have here at Cornell as compared with Jerusalem, Judea and Samara.

The soil is fertile here at Cornell and the fields are ripe for harvest (John 4:35). I firmly believe that God has brought each person who has come through the doors of CBS for a reason and it is my prayer that our fellowship would be able to be that fellowship to both one another as family – but also to enjoy the favor of all the people, that the Lord may add to the Church's number daily (Acts 2:42-47).

A theme throughout the year has been to ask one another, "What is your mission for this semester?" I will be the first to confess that I have not thought too much about what this means for my own life. It's been a struggle this past semester in every aspect of my life – definitely one of the most difficult and challenging in all my time here at Cornell. Indeed I would be a terrible leader and failure if not for Christ and Christ alone. I must constantly remind myself that I was not saved by my works, so I must not think that I can make myself any more worthy by works as well. Every morning is another chance for God's faithfulness to be ever present and displayed in our lives. I must remind myself every morning of the good news of the Gospel – that God loves me not because of what I've done, academics, spiritual fruit, or otherwise – but because I also am His beloved (Luke 3:21-22).

I believe this is important at the end of a long semester for anyone who may be reading this: God loves you and continues to pursue you. He has not accepted you because of who you are or what you've done but because God loves you so much He sent His Son to die for you. My friends, never forget the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It will shape and transform every part of you.

The coming weeks and months are sure to be a difficult road, so let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith.

Remember, sinner, it is not thy hold of Christ that saves thee–it is Christ; it is not thy joy in Christ that saves thee–it is Christ; it is not even faith in Christ, though that is the instrument–it is Christ's blood and merits; therefore, look not to thy hope, but to Christ, the source of thy hope; look not to thy faith, but to Christ, the author and finisher of thy faith; and if thou doest that, ten thousand devils cannot throw thee down...There is one thing which we all of us too much becloud in our preaching, though I believe we do it very unintentionally–namely, the great truth that it is not prayer, it is not faith, it is not our doings, it is not our feelings upon which we must rest, but upon Christ, and on Christ alone.

Discipleship Ministry

Dear Chinese Bible Study,

The purpose of discipleship ministry is to equip and encourage CBS-ers to become true disciples of Jesus. The vision that we had for this school year was to see CBS-ers encouraging one another to carry their cross. Our vision comes from Matthew 16:24, which reads:

Then Jesus told his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

We wanted to see brothers and sisters speak the truth in love and encourage one another to deny themselves. The basis for this comes from Ephesians 4:15-16:

Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love.

We especially wanted to see this develop through prayer partner (PP) relationships. However, as the semester has progressed, we felt our focus as ministry leaders shift to pouring into new and returning older prayer partners. In our recent older PP meeting, we discussed the different ways we've met up with our younger PPs and the importance of having a Christ-centered relationship. The discussion focused on solidifying our faith such as discussing the question "Why do you believe what you believe?" and intentionally seeing our lives in light of the Gospel. Overall, it was useful to hear about the various types of PP meet-ups and encouraging to hear the important lessons that we've learned from our meet ups. Personally, God has also been teaching us to evaluate our own PP relationships and how we can be better at leading our younger PPs to follow after Jesus. Serving as discipleship ministry leaders, we have also been humbled in seeing our younger brothers and sisters share the earnest desire to learn to become disciples of Christ and our fellow upperclassmen selflessly pour themselves out into others.

Next semester, we hope to continue to support the upperclassmen whether in facilitating more opportunities to share and pray for one another, or working through our various challenges together. In addition, we hope to really see our vision to fruition, whether through further older prayer partner meetings or sharing our heart with the fellowship directly. It is our hope that we become a body of believers who encourage one another respond to any trial by "carrying our Cross" through reflection on the Gospel.

Evangelism Ministry

Dear CBS,

It has been quite an interesting and challenging semester as your evangelism coordinators. Coming in, we were quite confused as to where God wanted us to focus. We heard everything from relationship evangelism to cold contact, from going out and leaving our comfort zones to focusing on where God had placed us. After bouncing back and forth for a while, we solidified the parts of our vision into a simple phrase: "Pouring Out."

The terms "evangelism" and "outreach" can be laden with baggage. We're afraid of being that person--the one that embarrasses everyone by being too pushy, or by trying to force every conversation into a conversation about Jesus. Sometimes we forgot that evangelism, at its core, is simply an outpouring of love. The more time we spent in prayer, the more we realized God wasn't telling us to do stuff. He was telling us to love. It's not about conversion or about numbers or even necessarily about revival, but of the state of our hearts. From the outpour of love that God has shown to us, we are called to pour our hearts out into others as well.

We all have our own burdens to carry. Between school and ministry and our friends and our families, sometimes it feels like you don't have enough to get through the day--let alone emotionally pour into other people! When God gave us a vision for the semester, He spoke out of a verse in 1 Kings.

"For the jar of flour was not used up and the jug of oil did not run dry, in keeping with the word of the Lord spoken by Elijah."

1 Kings 17:16

God sent the prophet Elijah into the desert east of the Jordan, to a widow who had nothing but a little bit of flour and oil--just enough to make one more meal. Elijah told her to use up the last of the oil and water, promising that God would provide. The widow did as he said. The next day, she found a little bit more oil in the jug, and a little bit more flour in the jar, enough for one last meal--and then again the next day, and the day after next. Every morning, when the last of the flour and the oil had been used up, they woke up to find that God had provided just enough for the day. No more, no less.

It's easy to talk about the tangible things in a ministry -- the numbers of people who come to meetings and events, or the number of conversations we've had with seekers. Sometimes ministry is dramatic like that. But sometimes the great work of a ministry is done in the quiet scraping out of the flour and oil jars every night. Our desire is that we all feel the burden to pour out, to give your heart in love and sacrifice to the people around you. For as much as our ministry is an offering, it is also a command. We were convicted by a verse in 2 Timothy, where Paul exhorts a young man he disciples:

"In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who will judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I give you this charge: Preach the Word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke and encourage—with great patience and careful instruction... But you, keep your head in all situations, endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist, discharge all the duties of your ministry."

Prayer Ministry

What is prayer, and why is it important? Why do we pray, especially when God is omniscient and knows the past as well as the future?

Reflecting upon questions like these and preparing answers to them, as well as others related to prayer, has allowed me to place even more importance on prayer. Knowing why I pray puts more meaning on the act that I once ignored and often took for granted.

Prayer is how we communicate with God, our Heavenly Father. In Luke 11, Jesus teaches His disciples how to pray – giving a general layout. Prayer is quintessential because it is how we know the will of God in heaven for us to do on Earth. Even though God is all-knowing and all-powerful, He still delights in us when we not only obey His commands but take joy in following them. He does allow us to harden our hearts and turn away from Him in acts of rebellion so that we may grow desperate for Him. Nevertheless, God listens to our prayers and where two or three gather in His name, He is there with them (Matt. 18:20). While Jesus commands us to pray in our rooms with the door closed, to our Father who is unseen (Matt. 6:6), corporate prayer is very powerful in uniting brothers and sisters in one body and spirit (Acts 2:42).

As prayer coordinators, we are met with this misconception that prayer is entirely up to us – that this two-member team is responsible for praying on behalf of the fellowship. To be honest, I took pride in knowing that I was placed in this position and misconstrued my role as well. But for all the reasons that I have stated and more, prayer is necessary for all of God's children, not just for these designated "leaders" who are simply facilitators. Simply put, prayer plays an integral part in our spiritual walk with God.

The goal that Wendy and I have for Prayer Ministry is for CBS to be a praying fellowship. The vision verse that I selected comes from Philippians 4:4-7:



And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Wendy's vision verse comes from John 16:24:

"Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you will receive, and your joy will be complete."

God has been working through us to witness these passages come into fruition throughout this semester. Frankly, I found it difficult (and I still do) to pray at times, and at other times I lacked the desire. But God has been using the people around me – family and friends - to encourage and challenge me to pray in every situation. I remember an instance when I was telling a sister about how stressed out I was feeling about a particular situation. Afterwards, she told me there was nothing either she or I could do, but to pray and to leave it to God. It did not hit me to tell God that I needed help until she told me that prayer should be my strategy. I was complaining that I felt like there was no one to help me. But that was false. I let God be my last resort, when He should have been my first choice.

It is truly a blessing for us to be able to serve the fellowship in this unique way, and we praise God for the good work that He has been doing through us, in us, and around us. We are excited to see what the spring semester brings.



Michelle Obama, because she is so cool. She seems like a good role model for women in general.


How would you describe a perfect day for you?



I'd want to have an actual conversation with him and get to know him.


How would you describe a perfect day for you?


How would you describe a perfect day for you?


How would you describe a perfect day for you?

Our Monday night bible study group has been going over key events in the Old Testament and relating what we read to the New Testament and modern times/our lives. Joy in Mission

This semester our group studied the book of Philippians to learn how and why to have joy as we live out our life of mission, the vision for CBS this year. Led by Jevon Yu and Jeffrey Yu (jyu^2), we have gone through topics including the definition and purpose of our mission, the emotions we have on this mission, our identity in Christ, and how Christ works in us on this mission. To Paul, the most important outcome of the life of mission is that Christ is preached, in every circumstance ["The important thing is that in every way, whether from false motives or true, Christ is preached.
