Editor's Letter

Dear Chinese Bible Study,

As we come to the conclusion of another academic year here at Cornell, it is only natural to think about the passing of time and how much has happened this year. For some reason, during the semester, time drifts along so slowly day by day, but at the very end we are all aghast at how the time has swiftly passed us by like a coursing river. It seems like just yesterday we were welcoming in the new freshmen at the Welcome Picnic and very soon we will be saying farewell to the seniors at Camping Trip.

I realize as I begin this letter just hours before Felly Dinner [for the third time] that after weeks of asking and pleading everyone to turn in their articles that I am the ultimate procrastinator. There is still a part of me that longs for the excitement, the drive to work my hardest during the final moments. Maybe its my fear of failure, maybe its my lingering strivings to be a perfectionist, or maybe its the possibility that something better will happen the longer I wait. And after weeks of pondering over my thoughts, I have come to the conclusion that it is all of these traits combined. It is because I am worried, anxious that I cannot put my best thoughts together and there is always something better that I could say. But that is at the root of all that we have been learning in CBS this year: depending less on ourselves and trusting that God will provide for us in all circumstances.

This semester I have been teaching a bible study called "The Truth of the Gospel", in which we explored various themes such as the blood of Christ, the cross of Christ, the eternal purpose of God, how to walk in the Holy Spirit, the Soul Life, and bearing the cross. The one theme common to every one of these topics is that our Heavenly Father has already done everything for us, and all we must do is open our eyes and accept His truths. It is the case with our baptism, receiving the Holy Spirit, and with our initial acceptance of Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior. Because He has made these truths known to us through divine revelation, we can partake in His goodness and glory.

Or don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like his. For we know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body ruled by sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin- because anyone who has died has been set free from sin. Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. For we know that since Christ was raised from the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him. The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. In the same way, count yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus. Romans 6:3-11

And so I believe that the biggest theme throughout the year, at least for me, is bridging the gap between knowing in my head that Christ has already done everything that needs to be done and all we need is to believe, and understanding how that plays out in my words and actions. At the end of the day, it is not about how much we "do" for Him, whether daily devotionals, Bible studies, NCPM, Thursday EV, prayer partner meetings, North Dinner, Friday night large group, or church on Sunday morning, I ask that you really question your heart behind attending these activities. Is it to ease your guilty conscience by doing things for Him? Or is it truly all about showing love for God and doing what He has called you to do? We do not live any longer by sight, but by faith (2 Corinthians 5:7).

I thank God for everything He has done through CBS and through the servants in the various ministries He has called. As you read through this edition of Bread of Life, I pray that you that you experience Jesus, the true Bread of Life, and look to Him alone for nourishment, growth, and fulfillment.

Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. Galatians 5:25

Evangelism Ministry

Dear CBS,

It has been a privilege to serve as your Evangelism Coordinators this year. It has been difficult, no question. For both of us, leading this evangelism thing has been quite a daunting prospect. Feeling unready and unprepared, we moved forward, sometimes plodding along, sometimes charging forward with full force. Our hope, however, has been that despite our shortcomings, that you would see the Lord's hand at work within us and that your hearts have grown just as ours have grown.

This year, the general vision was "Life as Mission," quite an "outreached-oriented" vision. At the beginning, we stressed over and over again that evangelism is not something we do, but it's a lifestyle that we live. But our understanding of this truth was shallow; it was good, in theory, but our lives did not truly reflect this fact. And as God revealed more and more of His truth, and the longer we gazed into our hearts, we just came back to this fundamental idea of what the Gospel means to us. Who is God, who is Jesus? Why did you become a Christian, and why are you still a Christian? These are basic questions, but yet they get to the root of all things. I'm sure many of us can answer these questions, but our response can be superficial and trite at times. Isn't the Gospel supposed to change us and uproot us? I would encourage everyone to really contemplate these basic things, and find the answer from the depths of your heart. Without this, there can be no evangelism.

Of all the ministries, evangelism is the one that always seems to have a stigma. No matter where you go, there's always an aversion to it. There is always a fear, whether that's awkwardness, inadequacy, criticism, or even death. Why is that? Is our God not with us? Do we not believe that the present suffering of this life is small compared to the future glory? Do we not consider our life as trash compared to the surpassing worth of knowing Jesus? Or perhaps, we're not afraid, but rather too lazy. But isn't this a matter of life and death? Isn't salvation at stake here?

A friend of mine phrased it like this: "The more I learn about being a Christ follower, the more I learn about how far I am from being a faithful Christian. Or maybe even a Christian, at this point." We are inadequate, in many ways. Therefore, we give God the glory, because he redeems us despite our constant failures. Paul, in 1 Corinthians, talks about how he did not come and share the gospel with lofty speech or great wisdom, but simply to know God. He came in weakness, with great fear and trembling. Despite this fact, God worked powerfully.

For those of you know who still have doubts about God, don't dismiss them! If you are truly seeking after the truth, seeking answers, then God will make Himself known to you. Get on your face and continue to ask God to reveal Himself. To those of you who feel comfortable, wake up! No one who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God. For all of you, continue to walk humbly with your Lord, so that you might grow into an oak of righteousness.

We love you guys, and our heart for you is that you come to the knowledge and understanding that God is the greatest joy, far above anything we could ever imagine. Nothing else in this world matters.

InReach Ministry

In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross! Philippians 2:5-8

This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. 1 John 3:16

While most of us may never actually be put in the situation of risking our physical life for another, I believe that Jesus is asking us to be willing to sacrifice ourselves for others. He is asking us to follow His example of wholeheartedly relinquishing ownership of our lives. In Philippians 2:5-8, we see how Jesus did not even have to come down to this world. He was God! And the simple act of Him lowering Himself to the form of man was already sacrificial, considering what He was giving up. Yet, He continued to show His love for us by humbling Himself and going to the cross. In the same way and to the same extent that Jesus laid down His life for us, we are called to lay down or give up our lives for others. We are called to sacrifice for others as willingly as Christ sacrificed for us.

How often are we willing to give up an hour of studying to spend with a brother or sister in need? How often are we willing to give up money we planned to use on our selfish desires to donate to those who don't have enough? How often are we willing to sacrifice the energy we use to do homework to serve the community?

For some people, this may be very often, but for the most of us, this is a rarity. Many of us are too caught up in fulfilling our own needs and pursuing our own happiness. We may give up the occasional hour we have to spare for another person, but that's not what Jesus calls us to do. He calls us to give up time that we consider precious and important. He calls us to sacrifice.

We challenged the InReach team this semester to be sacrificial in our relationships with brothers and sisters, non-Christian friends, and even those that aren't friends. How would we be different from non-believers if we were a body that lived selfishly and not as if loved by a loving and powerful God? We need to learn to give up what's important to us without expecting anything in return.

No sacrifice will ever be more difficult than the one Jesus made. What excuse do we have for not sacrificing as Jesus did?

Praise Ministry

For this year's bible study we continued our vision for praise team from last semester—"Living Worship." Last semester we studied mainly biblical stories of people who were able to praise God despite their circumstances and how their actions revealed their attitudes towards God. This semester, we explored more in depth the meaning of not just praise, but worship: what worship means, and how we should worship as true believers.

"Yet a time is coming and has now come when the true worshipers will worship the Father in the Spirit and in truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks. God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth." John 4:23-24

As written in the scriptures, to worship effectively, we must worship God in Spirit and in truth. This requires two levels of connection with God: a spiritual connection, where our attitude, mind, and spirit are all aligned with God's Spirit, and an intellectual connection, where we praise God for who He truly is, and not some distorted concept or skewed vision. To do this requires humility as well as intimacy with God. Christ's sacrifice has made a way for us to be in a personal relationship with God (Hebrews 10:19-25). As we draw closer to Him we will become more aware of how great He is and how weak we are; when we worship God in this humility, He will lift us up (James 4:6-10).

Our goal as CBS praise team is not to play the best sounding worship set. Rather, we want to encourage the fellowship to think of worship as more than simply singing songs or playing music. We included a time of prayer and reflection between our worship sets so that our worship is focused on God rather than the music. We want to remind ourselves that we are not simply observers listening to some "Christian music on Friday nights", but rather active participants who are striving to worship God daily by offering our entire lives as "living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to the Lord" (Romans 12:1). May everything that we do become worship as we do it all for God's glory.

Prayer Ministry

Effective prayer is the fruit of a relationship with God.

In our North Campus Prayer Meetings (NCPM) this semester, we have been blessed to experience the power and unity that prayer brings. Through individual and corporate prayer, we have come to encounter our God in a more personal way, to put into practice carrying each other's burdens, and to know the power of prayers offered in faith through the Spirit.

Personal

We usually began with scripture reading of selected psalms and personal meditations on the passages to quiet our hearts before the Lord and to seek Him in prayer, which involves both talking to and hearing from Him. Sometimes we "prayed until we really prayed", which meant that we might take a while to get past the formality and structure of standard prayers, but we eventually would come to delight in God's presence, to rest in His love and to cherish His will during our meetings and beyond. As the Lord revealed Himself to us personally and intimately in these precious settings, we could often tangibly feel the joy, the peace, and the freedom in the Spirit!

Practical

Coming together in NCPM to commit to prayer is such a practical way to apply the biblical commands, "love one another" (John 13:34) and "pray for one another" (James 5:16). There were times when we prayed together as a whole group and other times we split into smaller groups or pairs to share and pray. Through persistent prayers for the fellowship and each other, we have come to appreciate more deeply the beauty of the body of Christ bearing each other's burdens and stirring one another toward love and good deeds (Hebrews 10:24). As we became more transparent with one another about our walks, we often encouraged and challenged each other to flee from temptations, to pursue holiness and to draw near to our Lord. I remember there were many instances when we felt God convicting and touching our hearts through our brothers and sisters' prayers. These signs not only confirmed that our God longs to speak to us, but also served as a testimony to the Spirit's desire to unite the body of Christ.

Powerful

Yes, the power of prayers. This is such an exciting thing to talk about! The Spirit who raised Christ Jesus from the dead is the same Spirit who dwells in us and leads us to pray! Ask and it will be given to you (Matthew 7:7). We were always reminded to intercede in this kind of spirit – with the knowledge that prayers offered in faith are effective and powerful (James 5:15) and that our God could do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine (Ephesians 3:20). This mentality really freed us and empowered us to pray boldly for CBS, for the Christian community on campus, for Cornell, for Ithaca, for all of the US, for the global church and for the rest of the nations. And as we prayed for bigger things, God opened our eyes to see His glory and His heart for His lost sheep and chosen ones. Though sometimes the burden that the Spirit revealed to us might have seemed heavy, we could be sure that we could cast all of them onto our Lord Jesus, whose yoke is easy and burden is light. Let us never cease to worship our glorious God in prayer!

Prayer for you

Our prayer for you all is that you may learn to pray by praying. Make time to communicate with the Lord for He desires to show Himself to you! We often do not pray because we do not make the time to do so! As you spend more time in prayer and in seeking His face, you will truly experience more of His blessings, be renewed in your inner being and be strengthened in your faith!

My sacrifice, O God, is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart you, God, will not despise. - Psalm 51:17

I exhort you CBS, to be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer (Romans 12:12).

Short-term: I will be working in Air Products and Chemicals, probably in Houston. Long-term: serve God.



there; maybe I'd do a little work.


What is the most important thing that God has taught you in the past four years?




What is the most important thing that God has taught you in the past four years?






What is the most important thing that God has taught you in the past four years?


A short-term goal is going to SUNY Upstate Medical University. Long-term goals are becoming a doctor (primary care), getting married, and starting a family.

My short term plan is to find a job and my long term plan is to go to graduate school and settle down in a city with a dog and a family. Interviewer: Harry He



Though our schedules didn't match up to meet up in person, I had the privilege to interview our beloved senior hotelie and Cornell EMS agent (more about that later) Tim Chen over the phone. He was just as comfortable talking over the phone as in person. I learned a lot about him in our fairly short conversation. CBS is...

What advice/encouragements do you have for...


What is the most important thing that God has taught you in the past four years?


What is the most important thing that God has taught you in the past four years?

Historical Theology

Yipu Wang's Bible Study

Why do we believe what we believe? What is the Biblical basis for these beliefs? Where did our doctrines come from? These questions motivated our small group, led by Yipu Wang, to explore the history of our theology. Topics ranged from why certain books are accepted as part of the Bible to how Jesus was both fully God and fully man, from Catholic sacraments and traditions to the Five solae of the Reformation. Much attention was paid to early Christian heresies, as theology is defined and influenced by what is rejected as much as by what is accepted.

Resolving these heresies and evaluating their influence on our worldviews often proved to be a challenge. Like all good lies, the heresies contained some truth, typically in the form of Bible verses. Difficult examples included Montanism, which claimed that revelations from the Holy Spirit could supersede the authority of previous Scripture, and the Roman Catholic church's teaching that the Bible requires interpretation outside of itself. However, with the guidance of Scripture and Christian apologetics, we were able to discern the various fallacies espoused by heresies such as these and thereby better understand the foundations of our faith.
