Bible Study Ministry

Hi CBS!

This semester, we studied the book of Hebrews. Hebrews is a letter that was written to Jewish Christians who were tempted to quit Christianity and return to Judaism. One of the reasons we decided to study Hebrews is because it helps bridge the Old and New Testaments. The author of Hebrews draws on passages from the Old Testament to encourage and rebuke those he addressed. These passages would have been familiar to the audience and support the author's argument for Christ's authority. By reminding them of God's promises and faithfulness, the author encourages readers to remain faithful by pointing them to Christ in their struggles.

This year we had two goals we wanted to see accomplished in the fellowship, hence we had two vision verses. The first comes from Matthew 13:23.

"As for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it. He indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

We wanted to see people in the fellowship grow in their knowledge of the Word of God. The Bible is so fundamental because it reveals to us who God is and how He has provided for salvation through His Son. If our ears aren't opened to hear the Word or if we aren't desiring His guidance to understand it, we will not be able to bear fruit for Him. Additionally, as Christians, we are all called to be sowers of the Word and as such, we are responsible for faithfully sharing the Word, but ultimately God is the one who works in hearts to accomplish His purpose. By His grace, we can participate in the work He is doing in our Bible studies.

The second comes from Hebrews 3:12-14.

"Take care, brothers, lest there be in any of you an evil, unbelieving heart, leading you to fall away from the living God. But exhort one another every day, as long as it is called "today," that none of you may be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin. For we have come to share in Christ, if indeed we hold our original confidence firm to the end."

The normal Friday night large groups are a good time to fellowship and learn from a speaker. However, being in a large gathering of people, it can be difficult to be personal with one another. In a smaller group, it is easier to be more open with each other. We try to create an environment where people feel safe and comfortable with each other because it is so difficult to go through life's struggles alone. It is very easy to drift away from God, as the Israelites had done in the desert, if we do not actively pursue Him. One responsibility we have as brothers and sisters is to lovingly rebuke each other to make sure we are striving to grow and mature.

It has been very encouraging to see that people do come out to Bible studies. Traditionally, attendance has been a problem, but it seems as though people come regularly. It's awesome to see people seek after Him and desire to be in a community of believers. We as leaders have been praying to see the Word of God change the people of CBS, molding them to be more like Christ.

Prayer Ministry

Hi CBS,

It's been a good semester serving as your prayer ministry coordinator this year. As I continue to walk with (and sometimes fight with) God, I'm always surprised at how much God can continue to teach and show me.

Just as how communication is vital for any relationship to flourish, so too prayer is necessary for a relationship with God. And if our lives are now inextricably tied with Christ in every aspect, then prayer must abound in all circumstances. For this reason, our vision verse for prayer is from James 5.

"Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective. Elijah was a human being, even as we are. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three and a half years. Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops." -James 5:13-18

Here, we see that in good or bad, in sin or in righteousness, we should pray in faith, knowing that God will answer us. Elijah was a person like we are, and through his prayers, God worked in amazing ways. Many times, however, we don't think in this way. It might be that we "don't have time," or we think God is distant, or we don't think He'll answer our prayers, or maybe our hearts are far from revering God. Perhaps we think God is small and we confine Him into a small box, or we simply just forget. However, even in this we can take encouragement from the heroes of faith who

similarly struggled with God. Elijah ran away for fear of his life from Ahab and asked God if he could just die. Job arqued with God about His goodness.

David strayed many times and acted without consulting God first. Despite all these things, God worked in their lives so powerfully that to this day we remember them as men of faith. God, in their outcries and prayers of faith, responded in such a way to demonstrate His power and glory.

As I reflect on this, I am guilty of all these things. There have been times where I am scared of praying to God because I'm afraid of what He will ask me to do. I don't always think of prayer, and I don't always have even the small faith to ask God to move mountains. Even so, God is gracious. He let Elijah run away for months and even helped Him along the way before He asked Elijah what he was doing. When I pray, no matter where I may be or how distant my heart may be from Him, God responds and continues to call me to Himself, showing His glory throughout my life.

Our heart for CBS, as it has been for many years, is that we would be known as a praying fellowship. Our encouragement to you all is that God will answer our prayers, and that the prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective. Reach Ministry

Dear CBS,

Perhaps you were looking for the inreach article, or maybe the outreach article. But this year CBS has combined the inreach and outreach ministries. Under a new name, Reach ministry serves CBS by promoting love and care to all, from non-believers to faithful servants. It was commonly said that "inreach is outreach, but in" or "outreach is inreach, but out," but it was not easy finding a vision verse to encompass both ideas. Anyhow, our vision verse this year is Ephesians 4:32 - 5:2:

"Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. Follow God's example, therefore, as dearly loved children and walk in the way of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God."

This verse was on our hearts for a few reasons. It centers on the gospel, which fuels our lives. The gospel unites us, it gives us a common goal and purpose, and it informs our actions as well. Through the fact that Jesus Christ loved us and died for us, we have freedom from our sin, death, guilt and shame. How then should we act in light of this liberation? We can never perfectly imitate Christ in His sacrificial love, but our prayer for the fellowship is to press onward in this race, to allow God to work within us when we want to give up and to strengthen us when we feel weak.

ACE's are another great opportunity to get to know others in the fellowship especially those who are not in your class. It's relatively easy to create care packages or to plan for ACE's, but sometimes it's difficult to know or have the heart of service behind it. The engineering co-op program was one of the biggest reasons why I chose to come to Cornell. The opportunity to have 7 months of work experience before graduation sounded like such a great resume-booster and would make me a super attractive new hire post-graduation. 





Dresses because they are comfortable but you also look nice.


