Coordinator Letter: Darren Chang

Dearest CBS,

When the COVID-19 pandemic started all the way back in March, I had no idea what the fall semester would be like. In fact, many questions remain unanswered all the way up until the beginning of the semester and some questions are still outstanding (not the least of which is how we should "do ministry" in this weird hybrid environment). Juxtaposed with our unanswered questions, though, are the riches of God's mercy in this semester. We still have our Bible studies. Our large groups. Our prayer meetings. Our retreats (kind of). Informal(ish) fellowship. Discipling. Most importantly, we still have the Body and Jesus who guides us day by day. God is still faithful — in year 56 of CBS.

A few weeks ago, I stumbled upon this verse: "If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" (Acts 11:17 NRSV). What a relevant passage for serving and coordinating in this year! It's already been so easy to make excuses for uninspired ministry tainted by the flesh and the overbearing weight of the pandemic. Maybe one day we just claim Zoom fatigue. Maybe on another day we're just "not right" with the Spirit.

At the root of these, though, is simply wanting away from God many times because I haven't taken the time to be properly alone with the Lord and instead sought to lead and be with brothers and sisters with my sinful nature. As Dietrich Bonhoeffer writes in Life Together, "let him who cannot be alone beware of community." Yet, whatever we do away from the Lord is nothing compared to God and His power (of course, we shouldn't be purposefully disobeying God; as Paul might write, "by no means" should we seek to live in sin any longer). I was at once exposed and assured by this passage; exposed in the knowledge that I think so much of myself but assured in the knowledge that God has a calling for Chinese Bible Study in Ithaca on this campus in this year.

As we reach the halfway point of the year, I wanted to again bring attention to our vision verse (1 Cor 1:4-9). Although we emphasized it frequently at the beginning of the year, it's easy to forget the importance of having a vision, for it is what the Lord has set on our hearts to focus on for the year. Specifically, I've been reflecting on the role of college fellowship in preparing us to be Christians throughout our lives. In 1 Corinthians 1, Paul writes: 6 even as the testimony about Christ was confirmed among you — 7 so that you are not lacking in any gift, as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ, 8 who will sustain you to the end, guiltless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.

This portion of the vision verse really gestures at protracted preparation in being a disciple (i.e. a follower) of Jesus Christ. College is perfect for this preparation. In this transitory time, your faith becomes your own, no longer controlled by parents or serving ones. You begin to enjoy the Lord by yourself. You grow a relationship with Christ. You seek and crave teaching from others. But none of this occurs without forethought, prayer, and a vision of your life in and with Christ. No one is suddenly a perfect or even a useful disciple of Christ. That is why we continue to consider and pray over our vision from 1 Corinthians 1 and why discipleship and the realization and use of our spiritual gifts are critical elements of what we seek for CBS this year.

In my conversations with alumni and other Christian friends who have graduated, Christian life after undergrad isn't exactly easy. With the vision verse in mind, I've been thinking: are we preparing ourselves and our brothers and sisters to be soldiers for Christ in the world? Can we survive and struggle for the Lord when we aren't enveloped by the love of the fellowship? Or are we complacent and purposefully see past sin? Do we think "it's enough" just to have faith without going any further with Jesus?

So, consider this: since you've come to college, how has God sustained you? How have you sought preparedness for being a follower of Christ after college? If you don't have answers to these questions, or you're feeling particularly exposed by these questions, take winter break to think about how you can be a faithful disciple in this next semester and the rest of your time in college. It'll come quicker than you know (I can barely believe I'm graduating soon).

Coordinator Letter: Kevin Hu

Dearest CBS,

I write this letter to you all from a time and a place that I know all too well by now - alone in my room, on my computer, with a million other things to do. The setting probably sounds familiar to all of us, especially in this time of isolation.

This semester and this year have been tough on all of us in some way, and the story is no different for myself as a co-coordinator. The day-to-day grind has made it difficult for me to find time to reflect on what God has been teaching me this past year, let alone in all my years here. While I could write pages and pages that detail the lessons I have learned, here are two distinct yet related "themes" that resonate well, given the context of this year:

Turning Toward God

Times of isolation can often be accompanied by tough times, whether they be internal situations or events happening in the outside world. But God can work through these trials. We are called to count it all joy when we face these kinds of adverse situations, as they are a test of our faith in Him. It is said in Scripture, "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything" (James 1:2-4 NIV). Moreover, we are able to rejoice in the fact that God is present in our lives; we are never truly alone, even when we may feel alone.

But how can we face these trials? How can we get through the difficult situations in our lives? Short answer: it is only through our union with Christ Jesus. Not long ago, I was thinking back to last spring semester's Bible studies when CBS went over each of the "I am" statements in the Gospel of John. John 15:5 says, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." This passage tells us that we--the branches--are connected with Jesus, the true vine. If we are removed from Him, we are unable to bear the fruits of the Spirit. We are unable to properly serve or honor Him in what we do. We are connected to Christ Jesus by our faith in Him; this is how we are able to do the difficult things that are placed in front of us.

Brothers and sisters, whatever struggles you are facing, whatever battles you are fighting, I encourage you to think about God's presence in your lives. We're all facing uncertain circumstances these days. However, it is only Jesus (to whom we are connected by faith) who will carry us through. We are not bearing the burden alone!

Meeting with Others

Establishing Christ-centered relationships with others is one way that we can grow in our faith in Him, and can even help us recognize God's omnipresence in our lives. The relationships I have built with my prayer partners and with my older discipler have been instrumental in my spiritual growth. They have taught me the importance of being vulnerable, helped keep me accountable, and demonstrated to me the importance of a personal relationship with Christ. Overall, I have learned that building relationships with others is especially important during this time, as it is easy to get caught up in the isolation that is imposed on us. It is said in 1 Corinthians 12:12, "For even as the body is one and yet has many members, and all the members of the body, though they are many, are one body, so also is Christ." We are more than just individuals. We are each members of the body of Christ, and it is our calling to build one another up.

It has been super valuable for me to reflect on these relationships in the context of CBS's vision for this year. Our calling into fellowship connects with this year's vision of creating a disciplemaking culture in CBS, in which we form intentional, Godcentered relationships as well as teach each other and learn about Christ. As Christians, we are all called to be disciples of Christ, as well as to make disciples. No matter where we might be in our spiritual walk, let us take some time to reflect and pray on, and carry out this calling that we are given.

It has been quite the fulfilling experience serving CBS as cocoordinator this semester, and I'm looking forward to seeing what God has in store for next semester! Praying for each and every one of you!

Reach Letter

Dearest CBS,

This semester has been different and challenging for all of us. When we were prayerfully considering our vision verse for Reach ministry this year, we feel that with lots of in-person fellowship opportunities stripped away, what remains at the core of our faith is our personal relationships with Christ and how we build each other up into the image of Him no matter the circumstances. We came across 2 Peter 1:5-7:

> For this very reason, make every effort to supplement your faith with virtue, and virtue with knowledge, and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with steadfastness, and steadfastness with godliness, and godliness with brotherly affection, and brotherly affection with love.

In his letter, Peter exhorts us to press on in increasing these qualities, because they keep us "from being ineffective or unfruitful" (2 Peter 1:8). It is easy to be isolated from the world these days and to feel that our ministry, whether in community or personal, is not bearing fruit. However, these verses remind us that the effectiveness of our ministry is not determined by how many people we reach out to or how much time we spend "doing" ministry. While these are important means, the effectiveness of ministry springs from our inner, godly qualities.

Now is a great time to spend more alone time with the Lord and grow these qualities by meditating on His Word and seeking to understand what's happening around us from His perspective. Is He training us to be more steadfast in our faith? Does He want to increase our knowledge of Him, which is knowledge that only comes from an intimate relationship (Genesis 4:1)?

We can also pour more into a few fellow Christians or other friends in one-on-one or small group settings. These qualities, sometimes hidden below the surface, often show up in closer relationships. Do we seek and think godly things, even when no one's around? Do we strive to show brotherly affection and love, even if it needs more initiative and is sometimes inconvenient? God has put these questions on our hearts, and we hope they can bring conviction and help all of us grow closer to, not farther away from, Him during this time. Reach ministry, as the name suggests, reaches people. That happens a lot under in-person circumstances — large group tabling, ACE, welcome picnic, felly dinner, workshops. We started the year not really knowing what everything would be like, but we strived to keep as many of these components as possible, not for the sake of "tradition," but for creating a welcoming atmosphere that invites everyone to engage with what the ministry does: reaching out to people and showing God's love for them. In addition, we hosted a few Bible studies and workshops throughout the semester, one on our vision verse, 2 Peter 1, and two on the topic of spiritual gifts.

We praise God for bringing together members of CBS to host online games and prayer meetings for new students during Orientation Week. We also praise Him for pointing us to new ways of reaching out and giving us opportunities to meet and know new students. It's easy to feel like we may labor in vain, or be pessimistic and think, "no one will come to this anyway," but God lovingly humbled us as the fellowship came together to have fun and worship. We should always do our best for God, but He is the one who moves people (especially to get on Zoom!).

God also blessed us with Mountain Streams, a team of people from Cru who were going to do evangelical work in East Asia this year. Their cheerful attitudes and depth of biblical understanding blessed us in our ministry, and they were instrumental in helping CBS develop a closer understanding of what it means to disciple each other in the body of Christ and make more disciples in the world.

Dearest CBS, as school wraps up and we enter into winter break, we encourage you all (including ourselves) to continue to embrace 2 Peter 1; don't become lazy or complacent in the familiarity of home, but make every effort to pursue godly traits wholeheartedly, lifting each other up with love from Zoom to Zoom.

Praise Letter

Dear CBS,

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During the summer, it became apparent to us that Fall 2020 would be a very different semester for Praise Team. Our typical worship sets in Goldwin Smith could no longer happen, our longstanding tradition of moving heavy equipment would have to be put on hold, and our song and praise would have to be broadcast over the internet. In spite of these changes, we had faith that God would empower us in this unfamiliar territory.

Though our medium of worship would be completely different this semester, our purpose would remain the same. Before the semester started, we had decided on a vision verse together, from Ephesians 5:18b-21:

> Be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with your heart, giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ.

In Ephesians 5, we are told to be filled with the Spirit, sing songs to the Lord, give thanks to the Father, and submit to one another out of reverence for Christ. We hoped to do all of these within Praise Team, and also to encourage CBS to do the same. It would certainly look different in our virtual semester, but our vision and our heart would still be set on the same goals.

In light of our vision for Praise ministry to encourage fellow brothers and sisters in understanding better what it means to truly worship God both corporately as a body and personally, our first Praise Team meeting of the semester focused on discussing some fundamental questions: Why do we worship God? What does it mean to worship God? Why do we have Praise Team? These discussions pressed on our hearts the reminder that knowing and believing the gospel is central to our worship of God, to worship Him in Spirit and in truth (John 4:23-24). Praise Team has put this into practice to encourage the fellowship in corporate worship by making our time of virtual worship more accessible during every large group, providing Scripture references and gospel-centered messages when introducing and explaining songs and themes chosen for worship sets. What a blessing it has been to be reminded in songs and psalms of the truth God speaks to us in His Word, to be encouraged by Praise Team members thoughtfully and prayerfully choosing sets and themes to introduce to the fellowship. To encourage personal worship, we held open Praise Team meetings to discuss what worship is, and how to analyze lyrics and messages of worship songs. We also held a virtual Night of Worship with prayer stations (Google Slides and Zoom rooms) -- praise God for growing faithful, servant hearts among our Bible Study and Prayer Group leaders in preparing prayer station prompts and in Praise Team members in faithfully and diligently serving on set despite the challenges of virtual worship sets.

After a challenging semester with surprises at every turn, it is our hope that CBS would continue to worship God personally and corporately, no matter what things look like in the near future. We have many things to look forward to in the coming semester, and after seeing how God provided for us this semester, we can be more confident than ever in praising and worshiping Him. It is our prayer that we would continue to persevere in love and good deeds, that we would continue to obey God and rely on Him for our strength, and to be a witness to His name in our daily walks. As we find peace and rest in this Christmas season, let us reflect on the Gospel and be grateful for the blessings that God pours out onto us. It has been a long year for all of us, and we look forward to the day that we will be able to physically meet once again and shout to the Lord in praise and worship.

Discipleship Letter

Dear CBS,

Discipleship ministry isn't the flashiest ministry. We aren't constantly putting on events and we aren't on set each week. Heck, we don't even have our own leadership external to other ministries. Yet, our focus on discipleship this year has meant that discipleship ministry sits at the spiritual core of CBS.

Vision for Discipleship

Although discipleship has been integral to the vision of CBS from the very beginning of the summer, finding a vision that would fold into while existing separately from the overall vision of the fellowship wasn't easy. But praise God: the verse we chose (Heb. 12:1-2) has been a guiding light as we've weathered growing disciples and building discipleship this semester. The verse speaks to "[running] with endurance the race that is set before us." Amidst the late nights putting together the workshop presentation and hours of prayer that we needed as we paired prayer partners, we've been able to run this race with God-given strength and endurance. Amen for that!

Our heart for this ministry is to create a disciple-making culture. We want to follow Christ and to make followers of Christ. We want everyone in this fellowship to be equipped and prepared to be a disciple and to disciple others. This might seem like a big ask — for everyone to be involved with Christ in this way — but it is the basis of our relationship with Him and with one another in the Body.

As we were thinking about our vision for discipleship, we found ourselves asking what discipleship is and what a culture of discipleship means for CBS. We felt the need to clarify what prayer partnership is - another CBS term we throw around so much that its original meaning starts to fade away. As a result, the ministry decided to have a discipleship workshop where we look for answers in Scripture.

Discipleship Workshop

While the Bible clearly defines who a disciple is (Matt. 4:19) and how we should be a disciple of Christ, it is not clear what discipleship means in the context of our relationships with other people. However, we've found examples throughout the New Testament. In the Gospels, Jesus intentionally and extensively discipled the twelve. In his letters to Timothy, Paul wrote about how he discipled his "true child in the faith" (1 Tim. 1:2). In the book of Acts, the apostles exhorted early Christians (Acts 11:23) and taught them in the church (Acts 11:26). Scripture reveals to us that discipleship includes intentional, living relationships in three directions. Upward is between us and the Lord, whom we follow and obey; inward is between us and

other believers whom we teach and learn from; outward is between us and the world where we share the Gospel and make more disciples (Matt. 28:18-20). As we struggled with a clear definition of the word "discipleship," we realized that it actually covers the basis of our faith — a personal relationship with Christ — and calls for all that God provides, teaches, and commands us. It is a way of living.

Praise God that He has led us to this deep conviction and has given us the opportunity to share it with CBS. We were encouraged by the prompted discussions in breakout rooms during the discipleship workshop, and we pray that this is just the start of our conversations about discipleship.

Prayer Partnerships / Disciplers

Prayer partnership is one way of getting involved in intentionally discipling and being discipled by others in CBS. More prayer partner pairings were made this year (check out the prayer partner tree!). We are thankful for upperclassmen stepping up to be older prayer partners, and for the eagerness of younger prayer partners to learn more about God through a sisterly or brotherly partnership. We also encourage all of us, especially upperclassmen, to be discipled by an older member of the Christian community. This year, we were blessed to have people from the Mountain Streams Team disciple some of us as well.

Exhortation in Pandemic Times

The pandemic has caused us to be more physically isolated from one another and has placed limitations on in-person meetings. This has impacted our discipling relationships in different ways—perhaps we don't meet as often or are limited to seeing each other from the shoulders-up in a Zoom call. But God works through these challenges that we face; He reminds us that He is made strong in our weaknesses, and that we can place our full confidence in Him.

While we may be lonelier or feel wearier because of COVID, we should continue to meet (Heb. 10:25) and turn one another toward God, show His love to others, and grow together in our faith. Whether that looks like a Zoom call, a socially-distanced meetup, or times of fellowship with other brothers and sisters, let's continue to build one another up. The circumstances around us can change but the God we love and serve never changes. We pray that, through our discipleship relationships, we may continue to draw near to God and listen to the Spirit's leading.

Prayer Group Letters

Dear CBS,

This year's Monday Prayer group was a wonderful blessing to me and so encouraging to be a part of. Even though we couldn't see each other in person, we had meetings on zoom and explored a variety of topics throughout the semester. In the beginning, we looked at examples of prayer in the Bible and talked about how we should shape the way that we pray. We explored how Hannah's prayer in 1st Samuel and Mary's Magnificat in Luke both shared similar expressions of praise and joy towards the Lord's perfect providence, and how Solomon understood the seriousness of repentance in his prayer of dedication to the temple. We then looked at excerpts from devotionals, from Spurgeon's devotionals about the power of prayer to Chamber's reminder about the living hope that is Christ. We discussed as a prayer group whether or not we agreed with their points about the Word, and how we should live our lives differently after hearing their words of encouragement. Finally, we moved onto a time of pure sharing and praying. We shared the things that made us smile or worry in the past week, and any prayers that we had for ourselves, our communities, and the world.

As the semester continued, we shared less of the niceties in our lives and more of our personal concerns and our joys. While I know that this year brought a lot of obstacles into our lives, it did not stop us from praying, comforting, and rejoicing with each other, and it did not stop the Lord from answering countless prayers and bringing peace into our hearts. Prayer Group Letters

Dear CBS,

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A passage from the Bible I've been reminded of lately is Psalm 133:

How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity! It is like precious oil poured on the head, running down on the beard, running down on Aaron's beard, down on the collar of his robe. It is as if the dew of Hermon were falling on Mount Zion. For there the Lord bestows his blessing, even life forevermore.

While the Wednesday prayer group this semester was far from "living together", with members Zooming in from multiple states and countries, by the grace of God we were in unity. And because of our unity with Jesus Christ, we know our virtual gatherings were good and pleasing to God, like precious oil and refreshing dew.

But that is not to say that everything was perfect. Having led a prayer group last fall and participated in one virtually last spring after the COVID-19 lockdown, I thought I'd be prepared to lead another prayer group this semester. To my surprise, I encountered new challenges over Zoom and sometimes a lack of inspiration for what to do and share during meetings. Also, for everyone in the prayer group, the lack of one-on-one interactions we normally have in in-person meetings made the necessity and difficulty of reaching out to each other become more apparent.

So praise God that he doesn't waste a single trial, but always works for the good of those who love him (Romans 8:28). This semester taught me the importance of spending quality time, well in advance, with God in preparation for a prayer meeting. Most of the times that I felt frustrated at not having a verse or plan I felt confident about sharing or following, I realized I had not patiently asked and waited on God in prayer. When I did, he was faithful to draw near (James 4:8) and provide, through readings and/or support from the servant team. The beauty is that he responds to our prayers not because of our own merit or eloquence, but because Christ has cleansed our hearts and opened for us the way to the Father (Hebrews 10:19-22). Together, the Wednesday prayer group also learned the value of consistently building one another up and holding each other accountable, especially while physically distant, because Christ said, "where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them." (Matthew 18:20) This could look like rejoicing over each other's blessings, offering words of comfort or advice for each other's struggles, sharing verses with another person throughout the week, or checking in periodically on someone's prayer request. Just as iron sharpens iron, so the Word of God from another brother or sister in Christ sometimes speaks more clearly and applicably than it could from ourselves (Proverbs 27:17).

Aside from being built up by fellowship and accountability, it was always encouraging to simply see others who had made a commitment to come to prayer meetings, as well as those who couldn't always make it but added their prayer requests to our ongoing Google Doc. At prayer meetings, we were often uplifted by each other's' insights on scripture passages, reflections on application questions, and updates on prayer requests. It was especially joy-giving to see some prayer requests turn into praise reports, and humbling to see other requests needing more patience and perseverance.

If we could concisely phrase our main takeaway from this semester, I think it would be how essential fellowship is to prayer and prayer is to fellowship. As mentioned before, each believer brings the presence of Christ to another, and since Christ is life (John 11:25), it's no surprise that in fellowship God bestows "life forevermore". Hence, fellowship that stems from our identities in Christ refines and strengthens our own spiritual lives and private prayer. Likewise, genuine unity and brotherly love should involve caring about each other's needs and bearing each other's' burdens (Galatians 6:2), including praying for one another. And we know that the prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective (James 5:16).

I hope this letter encourages you, wherever and whenever you are, to not give up meeting with other believers and to pray continually (Hebrews 10:25, 1 Thessalonians 5:17). Both of these are disciplines, as well as delight. Let's ask the Holy Spirit within us to help us find ever more delight.

This was our first time leading Bible study and what a blessing it was! As you know, this semester we all faced a ~plethora~ of challenges, especially adapting to our new virtual environment. Nonetheless, our Bible study had many fruitful conversations over our Friday Zoom calls, meeting new friends and reading deeper into Scripture together. Each Bible study was even spiced up with a fun ice breaker... would you rather have fingers for legs or legs for fingers? Would you rather find your missing sock or \$5?? All very important questions that transitioned us into very important discussions.

This semester we wanted our group to focus on the basics of the Bible while reading through Scripture. What is the Bible? Why do we read it? How can we best apply it in our lives? These questions seem trivial on the surface, but beginning on day one of Bible study, we wanted to look closer at our answers to those prompts. We pray that this discussion was effective in shifting our group's perspective on what the purpose of the Bible is and why we hold Bible studies as a fellowship. What our group concluded is that the Bible is the truth, the Bible offers guidance, the Bible solidifies who we are as Christians, and the Bible is God's way of communicating to us. And it is the Bible that gives us the history of Jonah and Malachi, the two minor prophets whose stories we studied together this semester.

We read about how Jonah did not immediately follow God's orders to go to Nineveh to save the Ninevites, but instead fled to Tarshish to escape the Lord. But as Jonah was in the belly of the fish for three days, he says a prayer and asks for forgiveness from the Lord. Jonah then goes to Nineveh and gives them the proclamation and turns the Ninevites from their evil ways. God saw what they did, relented, and did not bring them the destruction that He had threatened. One of the key truths that we learned was that Jonah's reluctancy reminds us of our hesitation to follow God's will every day. God has a will for each and every one of us and we should obey this calling when we hear it. We should not flee from the Lord for He has a purpose for us. We should submit ourselves to the Lord and follow His commands. God will bring us bountiful blessings and joy for what we have done according to His will. It was truly encouraging that our Bible study group was so eager to ask tough questions, respond in ways that added to our understanding of historical context, and spark connections between Biblical events and our current lives. We marveled at God's consistency over the centuries-- how He is willing to use those with hardened hearts (@Jonah) to follow through with His promises and demonstrate His infinite mercies. May we soften our hearts so that we hear His calls promptly.

Because it was difficult for most of us to feel socially connected to others this semester, we left a chunk of time after our discussion for one-on-one prayer, which reminded us that our unity in Christ can withstand physical separation. Combined with our Bible study, this prayer time is what encouraged us to apply lessons from Scripture into our lives and support fellow brothers and sisters in doing so.

We hope that everyone who participated in our Bible study was able to learn a lot from the Word and from the thoughtprovoking discussions we've had. We pray that our Bible study group found that our time reading Scripture together was not only enlightening, but encouraging so that they may live as willing servants of the Lord. 

6. What do you hope to accomplish by graduation?





6. What do you hope to accomplish by graduation?


I want to try food from every place on campus because like every where's closed this year.


By graduation, I hope to have a defined plan for my life. I would also like to establish and keep long-lasting friendships.


