What else would you expect from a staff consisting of two ECE's, a CS, a ChemE, and one solitary English major?;)



Apple Computer, Inc., long admired by tech geeks and average consumers alike for its consistent


output of original, robust, trend-setting, good-looking, and downright ingenious products, seems to have hit the bulls-eye again with its new limited-edition Ed Pak iPod line. More affectionately known as the edPod, this machine has carved out a nice niche for itself in the mp3 player market ever since its release in late August of this year...

Using an iPod to describe freshman Ed Pak is rather fitting; as an iPod owner himself, he is very fond of the machine, its capabilities, and its personality. Other than simply being really cool, an iPod stores an obscene amount of music, which suits Ed—an enthusiast of a broad variety of musical styles—just fine.





Made by some people in East Brunswick, NJ, this product was dubbed "Justin Cheng of the Economy Major," or "jcthing" (his IM) for short.


This freshman from the East Side (pronounced "Sigh-eeeed") would be an AC unit because he likes to take the humidity out of

Lisa Allen, winner of the Toaster Award 'cause she's HOT! *sizzle*



What are your pet peeves?


When my wife moves my daily cup off the center of the kitchen table and moves it to the sink. I have to get another one when I am trying to save her work from having to wash too many cups in the first place.


each other accountable. We pray that the relationships will continue to develop into loving and sacrificing ones.

Originally, I wanted to make this blurb humorous so that everyone would read it and laugh. But I don't think that doing so will do justice to the book of Hebrews.




Set apart from the rest: Cheryl is very afraid of people putting things (i.e. contact lenses) in their eyes, and she cries at every graduation (even if they're not hers).



her, although she tries really hard to at least pass all her classes, she is aiming for a B average. She thinks there are things more important than grades. She wouldn't like to study all the time.


She doesn't like going downstairs to take showers in the girls' bathroom.







Turning quickly, I half-expect to see him in the process of damning me to hell, but instead he's fixed his gaze on another unsuspecting passerby. I've always hated those people, ever since I was little. Scared the willies out of me—they still do.

Someone walking beside me chuckles and says, "Man, I'm thinking bloody pictures really aren't the most effective way to convert people."

"Yeah," I say, staring at the ground. Other copies of that pamphlet litter the pavement. They've been trampled, are marred with gritty footprints.

"You a Christian?" he asks.

The question catches me unaware, and I'm reluctant to answer, surrounded by threats of eternal damnation. "Um...well, I don't really know what I am. My family and I are kind of nothing."

"Oh. You mean like atheist? Good for you."

"Oh, no—no. Just nothing. I don't know what I believe in." The truth is, I'm kind of scared to believe in anything. So many cracks fall through. I look up at his face, expecting to see a young face to match his young voice, but instead I realize the guy I've been talking to is already in his early thirties, wearing a stained, ratty flannel shirt instead of a varsity jacket. Pale blond stubble covers his chin, and he looks like he hasn't showered in days. Nasty. It's beginning to drizzle, so I mumble something about having delicate health, and duck into a coffee shop.
