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# COORDINATOR LETTER MATT WONG

If there has been one thing that I've learned this semester it's that Christianity isn't easy. The call to Christian discipleship is a difficult commitment because the harder you listen and the more vigilant you are, the more you start realizing that being a Christ follower is a lot harder than just waking up on a Sunday morning to go to church.

While it has often been perverted in today's Christian community, Christ's calling is one of radical movement, unabashed devotion, and always, difficult sacrifice.

In Matthew 8:22 and Luke 9:60, a man tells Jesus that he wants to follow him into the ministry, but that before he can do so he must first bury his dying father.

It should be noted that in a patriarchal Jewish community, burying one's father is not only expected, but required of a good son or daughter. So it's entirely reasonable that this man would ask Christ to wait, to give him a few days or even a few hours before he joins Jesus in his ministry.

But what's Christ's response?

"Let the dead bury their own dead, but you go and proclaim the Kingdom of God."

Or in simpler terms: "Forget the dead. My ministry of *life* is happening right now."

In calling this man to a discipleship lifestyle, Christ demands that the man deny his greatest comfort and treasure: his family. It is most certain that in this man's eyes, Christ's demand was not only unexpected, but also unfair. Doesn't this Jesus understand anything about familial reverence? Does he not see the importance of honoring your father and mother like the Ten Commandments instruct? What the heck is his deal?

The answer is found plainly in Christ's response.

He commands the man to go proclaim the Kingdom of God because Jesus is all about Kingdom work, and in order for men and women to take part in that—to be his disciples—they've got to leave their comforts behind, whether it's their friends, families, or vocations. Christ bottom lines it and says that there is

absolutely no space for earthly comfort in heavenly ministry.

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Throughout his preaching and teaching, you'll find that Jesus always goes for the gut and never fudges with grey tones. The man is black and white. He calls his followers to choose sides. Abandon everything for his sake or don't follow him at all. That is the call presented to the man with the dying father, that is the call he presents to Peter in John 6:67, and that's the call he currently presents to us.

The more I live, the more I realize that Christian lifestyle is not about being happy. We're regularly presented with divisive decisions, which command us to leave behind what we love and hold onto for the sake of the magnification of an invisible God. It's a difficult trade off, and we're often left with two options:

Either we give up because the toll that dying to yourself takes on your spirit is too much to bear, or we actually die to ourselves and, in the process, discover a more determined hope in and devotion to gospel work.

Christian calling intrinsically requires great endurance. It is no coincidence that Paul describes his life's ministry as a "fight" and as a "race." Near the end of his life, Paul writes a letter to his disciple, Timothy, and with his last words Paul says this to him: "For I am already being poured out like a drink offering, and the time has come for my departure. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing."

Paul's life is a testimony to the fact that Christian living is designed to deplete you and requires you to pour out your entire being until there is nothing left to pour out.

Essentially, if you aren't running on empty, you aren't really running.

But through the persecution, confusion, and exhaustion, Paul has a defiant hope in what God has in store for him upon his death, and he *hungers* for it. As tumultuous as his life has been, and as grisly as his end is sure to be, Paul hopes in the unseen, and places his being and faith in the reality of Christ's salvation.

Only through that determination does he gain peace.

This past year has been one of my most difficult. I've never felt as lonely, confused, and frustrated. I've never cried as many tears, and I have never

questioned the existence of a good and faithful God as much as I have this past school year.

However, through it all, Christ has proven himself faithful despite my doubt. In regard to the fellowship, my future, and my friends, the Father has proven himself sovereign. Despite the tears and hardships, the Lord was determined to prove himself good through my life and to demonstrate the reality of a true, compassionate God whose name is love.

He does exist.

CBS, as Paul realized, I hope we can together realize that the calling of the Christian lifestyle is radical and it demands that a choice be made. Either we abandon all for the sake of the glory of the Gospel or we dismiss such talk as nonsensical and crazy. If we choose to dismiss utter sacrifice as an idealistic notion not to be taken seriously, we will ultimately find ourselves at the end of our ropes with nothing but despair and a frayed existence. However, if we choose Christ, if we choose a lifestyle that determines to keep the faith and fight the good fight, I assure you that despite the turmoil and loss of happiness, that in the end, Jesus will prove himself to be worth it.

After years and years of facing the call of sacrifice, this year I have decided for Christ because quite honestly like Peter says in John 6, there seems to be nowhere else to go. But at the same time, I have begun to see how trivial the things I hold onto are, how they don't satisfy me or make me any more human. Romance doesn't cleanse my soul, my family can't bring me everlasting joy, and my academics don't give me life to the full.

But Jesus does.

And because of that Jesus is not only worthy, but he's worth it.

CBS, let me assure you that Jesus is worth it.

# MINISTRY UPDATES

# DISCIPLESHIP

Second semester has always been considered the "slower" semester for discipleship because the craziness of pairing the new prayer partners is mostly finished. However, I find second semester to be more exciting because it is usually when we can share more intimately and struggle more intensely with each other. I would be lying if I said that all the prayer partnerships were that way. Some prayer partners are closer than others; some are more intense than others. But it is not really about the prayer partners.

I am not saying that the prayer partnerships are not important. They are a very important and powerful way for us to support each other and to carry each other's burdens. My own prayer partnerships have helped me grow closer God. I have learned to love and encourage brothers in a way that I never knew possible. But our goal is not to love each other only through prayer partnerships. We should be caring for each other regardless of whether or not we have a formal prayer partner. This should be our prayer; that God will continue to teach us how to care for one another and to give us a heart that looks beyond ourselves.

The age old question posed by Cain in Genesis was, "Am I my brother's keeper?" (Genesis 4:9) In my opinion, the answer is yes. We are supposed to look out for each other, just as the armor bearer followed Jonathan with his heart and soul, and just as the friends of the paralytic had the faith to carry the paralytic onto the roof to lower him to Jesus. In 1 Thessalonians 2:6-8 it says,

We were not looking for praise from men, not from you or anyone else. As apostles of Christ we could have been a burden to you, but we were gentle among you, like a mother caring for her little children. We loved you so much that we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God, but our lives as well.

God has been teaching me what it means to love others so much that I can share my life with them. It is unfortunate that I have only begun to realize this at the end of four years, but I pray that God will work that out in your hearts too, especially for those who are still at Cornell. Do not stop praying or caring for one another, because God will give you encouragement through others. And when you have gone through your struggle, God will use you to help others press on.

# **PRAYER**

Although prayer ministry has had a later start this year than typical, it is certainly not hard to see that God has been working since the start. It has been an encouragement to see Him place the desire in brothers and sisters to go out to prayer meetings and to pray. As He has been teaching us about family, one thing that He's also been showing us is the importance of praying for each other. How grateful I am that He is One who not only shows us what is good; instead of leaving us hanging with a command too heavy for us to carry out, He gives us a lot of help – through His Spirit and through brothers and sisters.

It's hard to believe that yet another semester is almost over. And as I sit and try to reflect on the ways in which He has maybe grown or worked through prayer ministry, I find myself without many concrete gauges to assess these things. Nevertheless, it's been encouraging to see how He has been working in subtler ways, whether it be from leading brothers and sisters out to prayer meetings to working in prayer partnerships to answering uplifted prayer requests personal as well as corporate ones. And I trust that according to His faithfulness, He has also been working in individual lives, making us purer vessels for His glory. And part of that purifying process is surrendering more of our own desires and preferences so that His will becomes our own. When we come to a realization of the sin within that keeps us from Him, we are brought to the calming assurance that He too knows this and has already provided the way for us to return through the forgiveness that comes through Christ. Sweeter then the cross becomes, and sweeter will it ever be as He reveals to us His love. As we seek Him, we realize that it was Him who sought us and found us while we were still sinners (Rom. 5:8). How blessed it is to be able to pray to such a loving God!

I guess I will leave a verse that has many times given me the encouragement to keep praying — coming from Hebrews 10: "Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the Most Holy Place by the blood of Jesus, by a new and living way opened for us through the curtain, that is, his body, and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us draw near to God with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled to cleanse us from a guilty conscience and having our bodies washed with pure water...." May we take heart in this! That the way for us to come before God has been opened. And the same love that brought Christ to the cross and raised Him from the dead will also receive us as we come to Him in sincere and faithful prayer.

## **EVANGELISM**

If someone mentions 'evangelism,' what comes to mind? Is it talking to strangers in the Ivy Room? Is it a picture of a bottomless gap between us and God? There are many things that come to mind, but the question that follows is how. How do I share the redeeming story of Jesus with those who do not know it? How can people see my testimony through the way I live? How do I do this? How do I do that? It's not that these questions aren't important, but God has shown me this semester that one question comes before all else: How do I truly love?

If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames, but have not love, I gain nothing.

1 Corinthians 13:1-3

Has my heart really been broken for the lost, for my non-Christian friends? Often times I found that the answer was no. And no matter how hard I tried, I found that I could not generate or somehow manufacture this "love"? Does that mean all hope is lost? Are we completely useless now? There is hope.

And hope does not disappoint us, because God has poured out his love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us. Romans 5:5

But what does that love look like? In Acts 3, Peter and John heal a beggar, crippled from birth. Typical healing ministry story, right? Read on...past the leaping and running and praising, remember: this man, even though his legs are now strong, has never learned to use them. Is it surprising then, that by verse 11, the man is no longer running or jumping? Instead, he is clinging to Peter and John inside the Beautiful Gate.

You see? Theirs was not a hit-and-run ministry, but one committed to supporting their friends, regardless of their need. The beggar (no longer crippled, but not ready to stand by himself) did not need an eloquent apologist, or a radical transformation story; he needed the shoulder of a friend, willing to wait and let him rest a while. Peter and John met him there.

That's a ministry of love. Pray for that kind of ministry.

## **INREACH**

We started the year hoping we could inspire the fellowship to take part in our call to "be like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and purpose," recognizing that "inreaching" is for the entire fellowship to work towards. But a vision is just a nice collection of words until we are challenged to obey. We've learned that we don't know how to love. So how can we challenge others when we are unable to take it up ourselves?

When we first went to God's word to discover a vision for this year's Inreach ministry, we were excited by Philippians 2:1-5, which calls us to encourage, comfort and *love*; to be unselfish and to humble ourselves; and ultimately, to have the same attitude as that of Jesus Christ. These commands resonated deeply as we remembered the lessons that God had personally been teaching us. But as we dared to obey, we found ourselves falling short.

In struggling to love in our personal relationships, we found that our human capacity to care was so limited for even those we were close to—whether they be prayer partners, roommates, or friends. So how could we actively care for everyone when we couldn't even love a few? Physically, we couldn't. But God showed us that we could still be active in loving each other through prayer.

So many times we are easily excited by God's word, and so many times we eagerly approach the challenges He places before us. But so many times we press on in haste, forgetting that as God commands, He also fills us with His Spirit that empowers us to obey. So in our forgetfulness, we go forth with our own wisdom, hoping to win the race, but forgetting to run on God's track and not our own.

And this is how God has made Himself immensely evident in this ministry. He's shown us that His command to love is hard for us to follow, as our love is far from perfect. He's been teaching us that as much as we do and do and do, we can't really love in a pleasing way without having our eyes on Him, abiding in His strength, and seeking Him in prayer.

God alone is head of this ministry and we know His work is far from finished. And far from just being a call for the Inreach team, we trust that God will encourage the hearts of our entire family to do the same.

## **PRAISE**

Music. It has a unique ability to move us, to remind us, to inspire us, to make us slow down a little and just listen. We know this, even to the point that we are slightly wary as we sing, understanding that to limit our praise to a melody is to strip our worship of meaning.

At the beginning of the year, we had this ambition, as we always do, to learn more about God and what it means to worship Him. Within the context of praise team, I was convinced that this meant choosing meaningful songs with lyrics that spoke of God's character and ultimately were more about Him than how He makes feel. Somehow, though, we always get self tangled into these kinds of things, and pride and self-centeredness creeps back into our songs and our attitudes. It's quite inexplicable and honestly, kind of frustrating because I still don't have much of an idea what music has to do with this thing that we call worship.

I guess the only conclusion I can offer is that worship really has nothing to do with music. If we got rid of praise team, we would not be any less able, individually and corporately, to worship. As someone who calls herself the leader of praise team, this is... humbling. I was convinced at the beginning of the year that praise was not the totality of worship, and I never thought it was but I was still making more of this whole music thing than I ought to have, because God was not satisfied simply with my admission that worship is "more" than praise. Worship is not something that "transcends" praise, it is outside of and independent from praise.

Worship is a response and a relationship, and this semester my brothers and sisters have taught me what that really looks like. As much as a song can be a response to BE, much more so is prayer and evangelism and loving each other. Let this be a challenge to you - to explore what worship looks like outside of music, to respond in a way other than song, to understand what God's Word and His people have to do with worship... to find the heart of God in your pursuit of Him. I am keeping you in prayer.

### A VIOLENT GRACE

Led by Alex S. Lee and Edgar Lei

A prophet marries a prostitute; a young widow lies in the dust at a man's feet. A desert "date", dark nights, dark times; a purchase, an adoption, a debt paid in full... and the common thread that ties all these together is drenched in the blood of Jesus, whose life, death, and resurrection gave us a second chance. And another.

It is this grace that we have been studying this semester through the books of Hosea and Ruth. Through this study, we've immersed ourselves in the challenges to think about God's love and power in a deeper way: to really acknowledge God for who he is. There were times of confusion, frustration, surprise, awkwardness, and times when it seemed like we'd never finish... but just like our own walks with God, he brought us through it all.

The book of Hosea is a counterintuitive story of liberation: God tells Hosea to marry Gomer, a prostitute, and declares necessary wrath and separation through the very names of her children (Lo-Ruhamah="not loved" and Lo-Ammi="not my people"). After an unlikely courtship in the desert (Hosea 2:14—"Therefore I am going to allure her: I will lead her into the desert and speak tenderly to her"). Hosea/God saves Gomer/us by paying everything he had. In this reconciliation, Gomer became a wife, with children who are adopted into legitimacy. Through the reconciliation by Christ, we (the Church) became the bride, and are adopted into God's kingdom (Romans 9:22-26). Though like Israel, we continue to worship idols and "sacred raisin cakes" (Hosea 3:1), God shows his mercy and bestows his grace. Because of Hosea's mercy towards Gomer, and God's mercy for us, we know the truth when he says, "For I desire mercy, not sacrifice, and acknowledgement of God rather than burnt offerings" (Hosea 6:6).

Although Ruth is a more "conventional" love story compared to Hosea, the book of Ruth still reveals God's glorious opposition to any human comprehension. Set in the time of the Judges, when bloodshed and injustice reigned in Israel instead of kings (i.e., Judges 19), Ruth's story shows God's sovereignty and presence, redeeming through his love even when murder and hatred abound. Israel then is not so different from the world today (maybe even better), and yet Naomi, Ruth, and Boaz did what they could and tried their best to submit their lives to God in obedience. Ruth is a woman straight out of Proverbs 31, and her loyalty to Naomi, her courage in lying at Boaz's feet on the threshing floor. and her devotion to a God who was not even her own (she was from Moab, not part of Israel), all exemplify Psalm 37:4—the Lord gives you the desires of your heart when you delight in him. Through Boaz's "redemption" of Ruth (fulfilling the law of the kinsman-redeemer), the genealogy of Jesus was realized (Ruth 4:18-22), and more importantly, this reflects how Jesus redeemed us through God's grace.

The scarlet thread of Grace is indeed violent: bloodstained with Jesus' love, and interwoven throughout Scripture, as the truth is told again and again, so that we may realize our *need* of that grace as we receive it. Through both Hosea and Ruth, we see Psalm 119:32:

I run in the path of your commands, for you have set my heart free.

We praise God that the thread extends into our lives and continues beyond our deaths, and as God has set us free, we have full confidence to live.

#### CALL FOR CLARITY

Perhaps like many others who signed up for this bible study, I wanted to find out God's purpose for me. Instead of coming away with a specific answer to my inquiry, I came to a similar conclusion as one of our "theme" verses Romans 8:28, which says "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose". Before I expound upon this, let me share some of the things we learned throughout this bible study.

In the beginning, we wrestled with how to love God and discerning the roles of obedience and faith in loving God – are they independent of each other or linked? Then we discussed the commands Jesus gave his disciples including the Great Commission. A memorable passage for me is John 21:15-18, where Jesus reinstates Peter by asking him three times "do you truly love me?" when Peter denied any relationship to Him exactly three times before. From this dialogue, we learned Jesus only entrusts important matters to us if and only if we love Him. In this case, Jesus asks Peter to feed and take care of his "lambs" and "sheep".

Next, we learned about how God called Joseph, Samuel, David, Solomon, and Jonah. Joseph's story struck me the most because he trusted that God had a good purpose for him even though he was sold into slavery by his brothers and thrown in prison for something he never did. This story demonstrates how obedience to God's laws leads a person towards his calling. Joseph did not sleep with Potiphar's wife because it was a "wicked thing" and more importantly "a sin against God" (Genesis 39:9). Because God's words remained in Joseph, "the LORD was with him" and "the LORD gave him success in everything he did" (Genesis 39:3).

Samuel's anointing of David reminded me of how sometimes we feel inadequate for God's calling because we don't possess a vast knowledge of the Bible or pray unceasingly. God reminds Samuel. "The LORD does not look at things man looks at. Man looks at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart" (1 Samuel 16:20). While Joseph and David's story encourages us to obey God, we also thought about why we might not want to. Jonah fled to Joppa instead of Nineveh where God told him to "preach against it" because of "its wickedness" (Jonah 1:2). Eventually, Jonah goes to Nineveh to preach, but he still doesn't understand why God chooses to save this city. If anything Jonah's story reminds us how we can't possibly understand all of God's ways because "[we are] concerned about this vine, though [we did not] tend it or make it grow" (Jonah 4:10). Since God created the people of Nineveh naturally. He would be more attached to them then Jonah would. Therefore. when we serve we ought to remember that this is for God's glory and not our own.

"Does not the potter have the right to make out of the same lump of clay some pottery for noble purposes and some for common use?" (Romans 9:21) This verse sums up pretty much what I learned from this bible study. Simply put, God is sovereign and although we may desire to serve God in certain ways, those ways may not be in His plan for us. As for what one's calling is, I feel it is something that will be revealed to us once we love God and keep his words in our hearts. This was the case with Joseph and even Jonah to some degree. The fish spit Jonah out because Jonah remembered God. Therefore, "in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make your paths straight" (Proverbs 3:6).

#### RELATE

Guy to Girl: "Excuse me, I believe one of your ribs belongs to me."

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35)

Every Tuesday night, we gather in a cozy apartment in Collegetown to learn about relationships. During our first [Relate] Bible Study, our two wonderfully awesome bible study leaders, Hanson and Richard, told us to memorize the verse from Matthew 23:37-38: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind."

This verse served as the basis for exploring how our faith plays a role in our relationship with God, family, and significant others. And the most important things we learned?

God's Love: Over the course of the semester, we ruminated and questioned God's love for us. We started off learning about the most important love of all: the agape love from God. We learned that we should abide in God's love by obeying his commands and remaining in the vine (John 15:9-10). We should love others (Matthew 22:39) and we are able to do so in difficult situations because of God (1 John 4:19, Phillipians 4:13). His strength, grace, and love transcend to help us in our relationship with our Christian family.

Family love: After transitioning our focus to loving those in our family, we tried to understand the concept of how we cannot truly love God if we cannot even love our family members.

1 John 5:20: "If anyone says, 'I love God,' yet hates his brother, he is a liar. For anyone who does love his brother, whom he has scene cannot love God, whom he has not seen."

Loving our family ultimately entails being able to forgive, comfort, and deal with conflicts (1 Corinthians 13:9, Matthew 5, 1 Corinthians 6).

Romantic Love: We used case studies of couples who did not faithfully obey God's commandsnamely the infamous couple, Adam and Eve. Eve was not submissive to Adam, and Adam, in turn, was not obedient to God. The verse about how wives must be submissive to their husbands seemed controversial at face value. Delving into the passage helped us understand God's true purpose behind this command. (1 Corninthians 7:8-9). We also discussed that the path of remaining single is not necessarily a bad decision because then we are able to serve and focus on God. Parting advice for women? Choose a partner who can make good decisions, and, therefore, someone you can submit to, just like Sarah when she faithfully followed Abraham to Canaan. Men? Men must also respect their wives so that their prayers are not hindered and choose women who manifest inner beauty from their quiet and gentle spirit (1 Peter 3:4). 

# SENIOR INTERVIEWS


#### Editor's Note:


E: Whom would you like to meet/spend time with? Name a person from the Bible, and then a person of your choice (can be fictional). What would you do with this person?

S: Whom would you like to meet/spend time with? Name a person from the Bible, and then a person of your choice (who can be fictional). What would you do with this person?



J: I finished making several dresses for the Cornell Design League Fashion show this year...long after midnight!


G:Who would you like to meet/spend time with? Name a person from the Bible, and then a person of your choice (can be fictional). What would you do with this person?

R: What is the most interesting thing you've done after midnight?





R: What is the most interesting thing you've done after midnight?


A: Staring at the stars.


R: Who would you like to meet/spend time with? Name a person from the Bible, and then a person of your choice. (This person of your choice can be fictional). What would you do with this person?


R: Who would you like to meet/spend time with? Name a person from the Bible, and then a person of your choice (can be fictional). What would you do with this person?

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



M: Who would you like to meet/spend time with? Name a person from the Bible and then a person of your choice. What would you do with this person?



God placed specific people in my life to bring me to Him starting freshmen year. But the more I was exposed to Christians and the institute of Christianity, the more I was turned off toward seeking Him. My heart was so hard. I focused on finding the holes in Christianity and thinking judgmental thoughts about Christians...like how can this person call himself a Christian when he does this, this, and this. My understanding of Jesus was limited and reduced to how I perceived others living their lives according to the Word. I wasn't looking at Jesus. I was basing my views on Christianity on the body of Christ but I was only able to see the negative. At the same time, however, I was continuing to hang out with these people that I thought were hypocrites. I couldn't figure out an answer as to why though. It was as if these people had some sort of secret that I didn't know about.

So sophomore year I stopped going to fellowship. I would lock the door to my room in Cascadilla and hide on Friday nights when people would try to get me to come to fellowship. It didn't help that I was also living on a floor with all Christians. God was sending His army to get me but I closed the door on them and to Him literally. But there was something that kept me going to a small seekers bible study during the week. I had justified it in my head thinking "oh well it's important to the guy who leads it and he's a friend...I'm doing this for a friend. I'm going to bible study for a friend." Little did I know that it was God who was slowly chipping away at my heart. My heart. That was a whole other story. I was beginning to feel a sense of loneliness that I

hadn't felt before. I tried to fill this void with anything I could think of though I was unaware of these motivations. I got into relationships seeking comfort and love, but ended up dissatisfied and even more empty. I worked harder to get better grades but even that seemed pointless to me when I would get a prelim back. None of it worked.

Junior year, fall semester, I started my co-op. It was extremely lonely there being the only intern on the site and knowing all my friends were together back up at school. I couldn't really find comfort in living at home either... I just wasn't happy. God had started to reveal the sin in my life and I realized how much I needed Him. On my way to work, I would listen to this Shawn McDonald C.D a friend had lent me and I started to really pay attention to the lyrics one day:

Won't You open my eyes
So that I can see
The way that You are working in me
All I need is Your love
To come and fill this heart of mine
My heart is a desert that has gone dry

These words rang true with my heart and on December 28th 2005 I stopped resisting the Lord. I prayed with all my heart in my co-op office and felt not only peace but relief. 
My parents brought me to church as a little kid. I knew of Jesus, all the Bible stories, and even prayed the acceptance prayer a few times, never really knowing what I was doing. As I grew up and went through personal struggles, I never saw the need for God; it wasn't until high school that God began to change my heart of stone to a heart of flesh. He softened my heart to His gospel, placed people in my life that spurred me on, and it all led to my acceptance of Christ as a senior in high school, as I attended Chinese Bible Church of Howard County. Since then, God has been slowly helping me to see the full measure of His grace and redemptive work on the cross. Though at that point in my life I had believed in Christ's death and resurrection and experienced joy in it. I quickly realized that I did not experience Christ's dominion in my life.

As I went to college in
New York, God began to
challenge me in many
ways. First, He challenged my identity. God
took away my really good
grades and helped me to see
my identity was not in the

things of the world, but I am a new creation in Christ, in whom my identity now rests. And God who called me to Himself desires for me to "be holy. because [He] is holy." As I kept falling short of the mark, deeper sins surfaced and the level of idolatry in my heart was overbearing. I had to then grapple with the fact that I can't work in a human sense to glorify this Christ who is my Lord, so I became brokenhearted and crushed in spirit. I plunged into a state of worldly sorrow and feelings of condemnation. As God began to speak His truths to my heart -His truth that He is sovereign over all things, His truth that there is no condemnation in Christ. His truth that He who began a good work in me will carry it to completion (Philippians 1:6), and His truth that His grace is sufficient for me, I began to experience freedom. God spoke to me saving that there is NOTHING I can do to damage His kingdom work because God's will and purpose for those whom He has called is effectual, despite what I do it is by His mercy and grace that He has called me into His kingdom, not by my desire or efforts (Romans 9:16). So, He restored...reconciled...renewed. I began to realize that it was for freedom that Christ set me free (Galatians) and my Christian walk does not hinge on legalistic living. It is not centered on the do's and don'ts, but rather, centers on the sense of awe, reverence, and humility that spring forth in response to the ultimate love of Jesus Christ – that He poured out His life unto death.

Recently, as God has given me a heart for people, I began to serve more actively and along with that, I quickly grew tired. God has been teaching me to be weak before Him, and helping me to claim His promise that His power and grace is fully sufficient in enabling me to do all things through Him. A passage that stuck out to me during this past semester was when Jesus feeds the five thousand (John 6). Even after the disciples come back from a time of intense ministry and evangelism, they wanted to just rest and grab some food to eat (Mark 6:30-36). BUT they couldn't because a huge crowd followed them...at least five thousand. God's like, despite your own life, the world is dying and hungry, you will grow weak and tired, but the man who eats my flesh and drinks my blood will never go hungry. In the truest sense, Jesus is saying to feed off of Him because He is the bread of life. God's like: Less of you and more of me. You must decrease and I must increase. You must die, so that you can live. You must be diminished and I magnified. Why? Because I bought you at a price when I bore your sins on the cross. Your life...is mine...that is the cost of being a disciple.

God has been showing me that He is anything but passive and distant; He is personal and actively moving His gospel to the ends of the earth. And the more that I consider all things loss in comparison to Him, the more I see how much He desires to prune the branches that do not bear fruit and how He often leads us through the desert (Hosea 2:14), only so He can tenderly speak to us and transform us. And not only am I learning to delight in His ways (Isaiah 55:8-13), but, even more so, I am experiencing the joy and sweetness of being a child of Christ Jesus, my Lord and Savior.



## HUMBLE

We always proclaim that God is worthy of our praise, but do we emphasize enough the other side of the coin that God thinks us worthy of his love and grace? Humility is a big part of the Christian life and what God calls us to be. Brothers and sisters encourage us to humble ourselves before God. Have you ever thought what that means? For me, I naturally gravitated towards the dictionary explanation of humble as "having the feeling of insignificance." Every time someone mentioned to humble myself, I thought of it as a reminder that I am not worthy of God's love and grace. As a result, I was denying God's gifts. This mentality is wrong for everything in the bible is about God believing us worthy of His love.

My pastor recently did a sermon on worth, and he noted that we need to have a healthy sense of brokenness. I think the humble that God intends is this "healthy sense of brokenness." Note the term "healthy." By no means do I fully grasp the humility that God calls us to be, but I do have some insights on what biblical humility is not. God is light, 100% light. When we humble ourselves to the point that it brings about feelings of guilt, shame, and unworthiness we have strayed away from God's intention. The Voice of truth will never make us feel that way. Another reason I know my definition of humility was incorrect is by my denying of God's blessings. Denying someone's present means making null of all their effort spent looking for the perfect gift. It makes null of everything Jesus stands for. It is denying Jesus.

I recently finished Philip Yancey's book on The Jesus I Never Knew and the part that I remember most is a question asked to the author by a friend: "Do you ever just let Jesus love you?" Do you? God has lavished His love on us that we are called His children. Who are we to say we are unworthy of His love when God sees as precious to send His son as a sacrifice for our sins so we can have an intimate relationship with Him? How can we say I am not beautiful, when the potter himself created us in His image and everyday whispers I love you?

#### REFLECTIONS ON AMERICA AND ITS CHRISTIANS

I remember doing it from October during the major league baseball playoffs at every seventh inning stretch all through to one spring night standing at the back of the Performing Arts Centre as we very publicly serenaded a terribly embarrassed CBSer in the class of '07.

Those were the good times. I remember them fondly not only because they were a lot of fun, but they were also poignantly instrumental in shaping my basic worldview. Being an immigrant from the UK who lived in Canada, it should have been odd to sing those lyrics. ## COORDINATOR LETTER ALEX LEE

Hey – we made it. Our year at Cornell is quickly coming to an end. I feel a bit sheepish at my computer typing this, knowing I have a deadline to meet, feeling as though there should be some 'words of wisdom' to pass down. I do hope so. But in this precise moment I'm at a loss, sort of. Not for words, I won't lie – but there's this passage I've been dwelling on since a recent CCPM when I realized, Yes, we're almost done here. This is where the Spirit led:

"Forget the former things;
do not dwell on the past.

See, I am doing a new thing!

Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?

I am making a way in the desert
and streams in the wasteland.

(Isaiah 43:18-19)

Forget the former things. When I stop to think on my four years at Cornell, on fellowship with believers — especially at Chinese Bible Study — I don't know how I can ever forget. I hope that at the Cross we might lay down and forget the trials and failures, but not the lessons that were learned through them. Still, there's something else, isn't there? Our walks with Christ are more than the situations and even the lessons; it's you who runs with me "heart and soul" that really counts (1 Samuel 14:7). We have served and struggled together. There have been many joys; more than a few sorrows as well. And by the grace of God we've seen our walks grow closer with Jesus. And so we stand with crowns on our heads, "For what is our hope, our joy, or the crown in which we will glory in the presence of our Lord Jesus? Is it not you?" (1 Thess. 2:19). Now that's a little harder to let go. And yet at the feet of Jesus we will one day cast all our crowns, and there again we have it in black and white: Forget, don't dwell on it.

So how am I supposed to do this? This thing of properly forgetting? If you don't already know it, then when you're a senior you'll understand that there's nothing particularly heroic in letting go. It's not romantic, nor is it really noble. I'm glad that we have these songs we like to sing about surrender, but when it comes down to it, it's not as easy as we make it sound. It's messy. Just think of Paul and the elders at Ephesus in Acts 20. Like Paul, I know that I and the rest of the seniors have to let go, that it's time to leave. Because of this, I have

told and continue to tell God that I will miss you: I will miss my Wednesday dinners, my prayer meetings, my corny corny games, my prayer partner. And so we arrive at what is most difficult: How do you leave when you have begun to love?

When you start to love someone – brother or sister – you also begin to grasp how helpless you are to express it. It's a humbling thing. You try to help them and serve them, but after a while you realize just how little you can do – how flawed you are at your attempts to agape. And when that happens, what can you do? Do you remember the story of the paralytic and his friends in Luke 5? (It was a long time ago, so I don't blame you if you don't.) Fix him, the friends could not. So they carried him, literally, to Jesus. And so I, too, must bring you to Christ, and leave you in God's hands. We all have to do this for each other.

In my four years here, I've realized that as with virtually all things Jesus, it comes down to a paradox: He who loves his life will lose it; You still lack one thing, so sell everything. In this case: I can only truly love after I have first learned how to leave. I can only have you in my heart when first I've given you to God. And maybe that's all any of us can ever do. We will try our best and we will falter, and yet it's so sweet to experience grace once we've said, I love you – so I will give you to Christ.

It's not easy to "forget the former things," especially when what has been has been so good. Yes, the letting go is real, and it asks of us a certain maturity—freshmen, too, because you're older now than you were when you first got here. But if we've grown at all this year, then I can and will rejoice, for as real as the separation will be, so will God's promise stand:

"But now listen, O Jacob, my servant,
Israel, whom I have chosen.

This is what the LORD says—
he who made you, who formed you in the womb,
and who will help you:

Do not be afraid, O Jacob, my servant,
Jeshurun, whom I have chosen.

For I will pour water on the thirsty land,
and streams on the dry ground;

and my blessing on your descendants

They will spring up like grass in a meadow,
like poplar trees by flowing streams.

One will say, 'I belong to the LORD';

So understand that it's not just letting go, but letting go into the hands of One who is far more able than any of us. I will pour out my Spirit on your offspring and my blessing on your descendants.
