#### Dear CBS,





### **Praise Letter**

#### Dear CBS,

A few years ago, as I had gotten more interested in listening to worship songs, I found that there were a lot of great songs that didn't seem to be sung very often. So I decided that when I got to pick the songs I would make sure to introduce them into the set. That's also how I originally came across this year's Praise Team vision verse, from Psalms 96:1-3:

"Sing to the LORD a new song; sing to the LORD, all the earth.
Sing to the LORD, praise his name; proclaim his salvation day after day.
Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples."

But studying these verses more over the summer and during our first Praise Team meeting has made me realize that these verses have much more to say about worship than just picking new songs. In fact, the psalmist spends the first three lines of the psalm repeating that we should sing to the Lord, that our worship is directed to God alone. As many Praise Team members pointed out during our study of these verses, worship can sometimes become routine, especially for those of us who have been involved in church or Christian fellowships for a long time. In light of this, the psalmist reminds us that when we worship God, our songs should be new; as one Praise Team member put it, every time we sing we should be learning about and encountering His greatness.

Perhaps I've had to learn this lesson most pointedly in the hectic moments on Friday nights from moving all the Praise Team equipment to

setting up and getting ready for the start of Large Group. This especially came to a head during Night of Worship, when we had to squeeze in time to practice all four sets, make sure all the slides were in order, and handle any other lastminute changes before the night began. Even as Night of Worship started, I was still constantly burdened by whether or not all the logistics would run smoothly, whether the musical aspects of each set were prepared well enough, and whether the fellowship would be receptive to the songs that we chose. Coming from a musical background, we can often be critical of even the smallest mistakes in our performances and be taken aback when something doesn't go exactly as planned. But as the fellowship continued to passionately lift up praises to our Almighty God, my worries about the logistics of the night began to fade, because the ability to share in corporate worship a love and adoration for our Heavenly Father is something that no amount of human organization nor logistical perfection can muster. Only by the saving grace of Jesus Christ does the Holy Spirit work in our hearts to sing praises to our God. I'm reminded of the story of Mary and Martha, that we need not be "anxious and troubled about many things" (Lk. 10:41), but instead "one thing is necessary" (Lk. 10:42). As David writes in Psalm 27:

"One thing I ask from the Lord, this only do I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze on the beauty of the Lord and to seek him in his temple."

- Ps. 27:4

I'd like to take this chance to thank everyone on Praise Team for their tireless and faithful service throughout the semester. It has been a blessing and joy to serve with all of you, and I hope you have been able to find comfort and rest in worshiping God even in the midst of the most challenging and difficult moments. As we go into the winter break and the spring semester, may we continue to come before the Lord in songs of praise for how much He loves us, expressed so poetically in the lyrics to the song "Favorite Song of All":

He loves to hear the wind sing

As it whistles through the pines on mountain peaks

He loves to hear the raindrops

As they splash to the ground in a magic melody

And He smiles in sweet approval

As the waves crash to the rocks in their harmony,

All creation joins in unity to sing to Him majestic symphonies.

But His favorite song of all

In many ways, serving is very similar: with our own strengths we fall far short, but "God's power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Corinthians 12:9). God uses our strengths and our weaknesses, and it is in Him that our work has meaning.

As we look forward to the end of this semester, winter break, and the next semester beyond, may we stay strong in our faith, and live a life worthy of the calling that we have received, placing Jesus Christ at the center of our lives. Let us continue to walk in the companionship of fellow believers,

through the ups and downs of our time here at Cornell.

Let me end on one of my favorite verses from my devotionals this semester, one that has already encouraged me many times over the past few months. May it be encouraging to you also.

- John 11:40

What's even greater is that His Son had gone through living on this world Himself and have been tempted in many ways so He can empathize with us too in many ways (Hebrews 2:14-15 and 4:15). ### **Small Group Letters**

#### Dearest CBS,

What comes to mind when you think about prayer? How do you pray in particular? What does a "good" prayer look like? We asked these questions to everybody in our small group during our first meeting way back in September. Each of us took time to write (and doodle) out our responses on index cards, then we went around and shared. After that, all of the index cards were stuck into our freshly-unpackaged green-turtle-themed group journal. Those index cards remain in the journal to this day, but they are now joined by dozens of journal entries, prayer requests, and praises that all of us have recorded over the course of the semester.

Prayer is important because it makes us more like Jesus and reveals to us the heart and mind of God. A good structure on how we should pray is the ACTS of prayer. Adoration (A) reflects our praises of God's goodness, holiness, majesty, graciousness, and so much more that words can't contain. Confession (C) allows us to reflect on ourselves, to acknowledge our sins and ask God for forgiveness. Thanksgiving (T) highlights all of God's mercies and all that He has done for us. And finally, supplication (S) presents our earnest and humble requests to God and intercession for others.

There are so many powerful prayers throughout the Bible in which we can observe the ACTS of prayer and adopt such examples into our prayer lives. We studied several prayers such as Solomon's Prayer of Dedication (2 Chronicles 6:14-42), the Prayer of David (Psalm 86), Hannah's Prayer (1 Samuel 2:1-10), Mary's Prayer (Luke 1:46-56), etc. These prayers reveal to us the faithfulness of God in every situation and the

heart we should have for giving Him praise and thanksgiving like these Bible figures did. No matter what hardship we are facing, God remains sovereign and through prayer we can establish a deeper connection with Him to know more about His will and glorify Him in all that we do. Our small group gave everyone the space to share about their interpretations of the prayers and how they wanted to apply them to their own prayer lives. Now that we reflect on the semester, we both believe that by reading the prayers of various figures in the Bible, each of us grew in our desire to pray more frequently and intentionally to God.

Now, the design of our small group is unique (okay, every small group is unique, but hear us out) in that it extends beyond the weekly Monday night hour that we have together. Yes, we have a group chat and yes, we meet up with each other individually when we can throughout the weeks. But more than these things is our shared journal, a physical reminder that our prayer requests, our reasons to be thankful to God, and even our worries and confessions are real enough to be put on paper and shared.

The journal, paired with our study of various prayers throughout the Bible, held us accountable for one another's growth as children of God and fostered an environment in which we could share honestly what was on our hearts. Then, outside of the Monday meeting, the journal was gifted to one member to take home with them for the week to read and write in when they felt led to. Journal entries have varied from brief daily reflections to detailed accounts of God's working through highs and lows of the week to doodles of cats. It is a journal filled with color and personality, with the prayers and

learnings of God's children. It is a journal that tangibly shows how a body of brothers and sisters can encourage one another through prayer and thoughtful sharing.

So to those in our small group this semester, it was truly such a blessing to learn and pray and journal with you. We have both been encouraged by your heart for sharing and your willingness to be honest about your walk with God. Hopefully

you can say the same-- that you were encouraged during our time together and are now more eager to pray to God in all situations. We give all the glory to God and praise Him for maturing us together this semester. As always, we are praying for you.

Real - I try to be genuinely who I am, it's a work in progress and it's hard to be completely comfortable with yourself every day.


Emotional - cuz I am emotional aha Playful - I always like to do stuff and fool around.


### 9. What are three words to describe you (you can explain them if you want!).

Simple, introverted, curious.







### 9. What are three words to describe you (you can explain them if you want!).



Mature (for my age) - I'm not interested in the same things as my peers and am more focused on the future




### 9. What are three words to describe you (you can explain them if you want!).

### 9. What are three words to describe you (you can explain them if you want!).


- 1) Optimistic. It has been pushed into me because I have realized that the best way to get through challenges is to be optimistic about it.


